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Pg 3This school house is not on its original foundation and its condition is poor. All<br/>windows are broken and missing. Pieces of window frames remain. The enclosed front<br/>entryway appears to have been added as a lean-to after original construction. Its<br/>dimensions are 32 ft N/S x 28 ft E/W. The landowner mentioned to NRCS field office<br/>staff that one schoolhouse had been moved to the ranch headquarters around the 1950s so<br/>family and neighboring kids would have a closer school, but no teacher was found to<br/>teach there and the school was left empty. The now missing, large east-facing windows<br/>are one of the most noticeable characteristics of this historic school.

#### Site Feature #4: Corral

This corral has been modified over time as part of regular maintenance. The condition of the corral is fair. The corral is generally stable. Its dimensions are approx. 160 ft E/W x 130 ft N/S. Many cedar posts were noted in a pile nearby. Likely the original corral was composed of almost exclusively natural cedar posts. The corral does not have a historic feeling without the cedar posts. Connection of the corral to the granary suggests the granary has not been used as such for several years and that the location of the corral has been modified over time.

#### Site Feature #5: House

This L-shaped gable roofed, plain house likely had double-hung sash windows in a Plain Residential style, although all that remains of the windows is parts of the frames. No entryway is noted on the house. Exterior of the house is wooden clapboard while the interior of the house appears to have been wood lath with stucco/plaster interior finish. Plaster and lath are visible from the outside of the house in many places where the exterior has been removed. It appears that the house was added on to the west and north over time. Condition of this building is very poor as much of it has collapsed, the rest is unstable and the landowner has suggested that much of the old wood has been removed. The dimensions of the longest walls are estimated to be 50 N/S x 36 ft E/W . An old stand of lilacs was planted to the northeast of the building and some remain living.

Overall Ranch Headquarters: Many similar sites are noted across the landscape. It is not likely that this site will add information to our collective past. The building designers, engineers and builders are unknown. A files search produced little evidence of who built which structures. No important events or people are known to be associated with this property at this time. This ranch is in various states of disrepair, modification and demolition. It is recommended to be ineligible for any register as individual buildings and as an overall ranch site.
