1. Feature Description, Integrity, Eligibility:

The school is designed as a one room school house but with one on top of the other. On the south, the central door is up nine steps as the school was built along a steep ridge. The double door entrance is under a decorative wood fan. On either side of the door is a 2:2 double hung window and the upper level has three identical windows evenly spaced. Near the south end of the gable is an open bell tower under a pyramidal roof with small gable wall dormers. The east side has what looks like four bays, three with 2:2 double hung windows on each level. The southern-most bay on each level has either been filled in or did not have an opening. Shadows make it hard to tell from the 1986 photo. The partial view of the west side appears to show four windows on the lower level with three windows on the upper level. Where a fourth window on the upper level would have been (north) is an opening of the same size above a fire escape.

The school also served as the local voting place, even after its closure. It was sold in 1986 to James Sperry and Lou Hafermehl, who worked at SHSND at the time. When they took ownership, they were upset to find someone had removed the school bell, according to Mark Halvorson. It appears to be within the current boundary of Pleasant Lake National Wildlife Refuge. This type of rural school is very rare in North Dakota.





Thomas, who in April 1883 was the first settler here, when antelope were plentiful. On June 11, 1885 a post office was established at this railroad station, with Jacob Fultz, postmaster and named BARKER for the first railroad surveyor to stake a line through here. When Vernon H. Matthews, pioneer settler and former townsite owner was appointed postmaster Jan. 25, 1886, he changed the name to Oberon. He selected the name from Shake-speare's, "A Midsummer Night's Dream." The townsite was platted in July, that year.

PENDENNIS: A Northern Pacific Rwy. loading station on Sec. 1, Rich Valley Twp., named in 1921 by Perry Roth and Charles McMillan, early residents of this area for the hero, Arthur Pendennis in "His Fortunes and Misfortunes" by Thackeray. (76)

PLEASANT LAKE: Named for its township, which was named for the small prairie lake within its borders. This tree lined lake was given this descriptive name of James J. Hill, builder of the Great Northern Rwy. The Indians called it Broken Bones Lake. They camped on its shores to dry their buffalo meat, broke the bones and removed the marrow, which they sewed in sacks of skin and preserved it for winter use. Evidences of Indian habitation and burial are still found here. The post office at Pleasant Lake was established June 11, 1887 with Calvin B. Holbrook, postmaster. (7, p. 252; 72, 9/13/40; 80; 83)

RHODES: See ESMOND.

SAINT MICHAEL: A mission school established in 1874 at the foot of Mission Hill on the Fort Totten Indian Agency by the Grey Nuns of the Roman Catholic Church of Montreal, Canada, through the efforts of Maj. William H. Forbes, first Indian agent on the Fort Totten Reservation. The school was named for Saint Michael, "chief of the celestial hierarchy." This small settlement with school, store, church and residences did not incorporate but a post office was established here Feb. 25, 1932. (7, p. 268; 72, 9/13/40; 76)

SCHUYLER: See FLORA.

SPAULDING: An early day ferry-boat point on Grand Coulee, located on Sec. 13-154-67. Named for the ferry-boat operator, J. E. Spaulding. (11, p. 206)

SULLY'S HILL: A national game preserve — or a sanctuary for native wildlife and big game animals, that were abundant on the great
