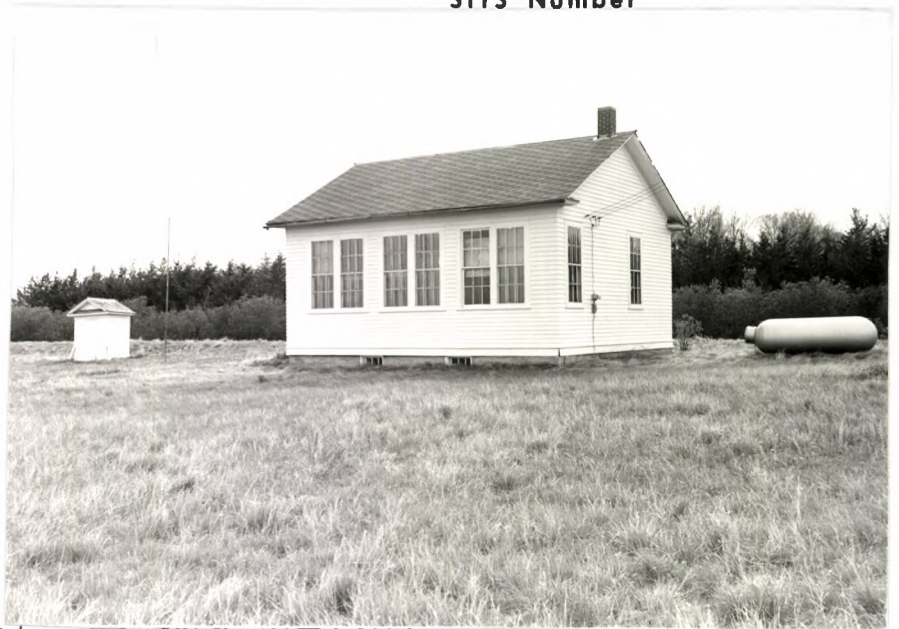
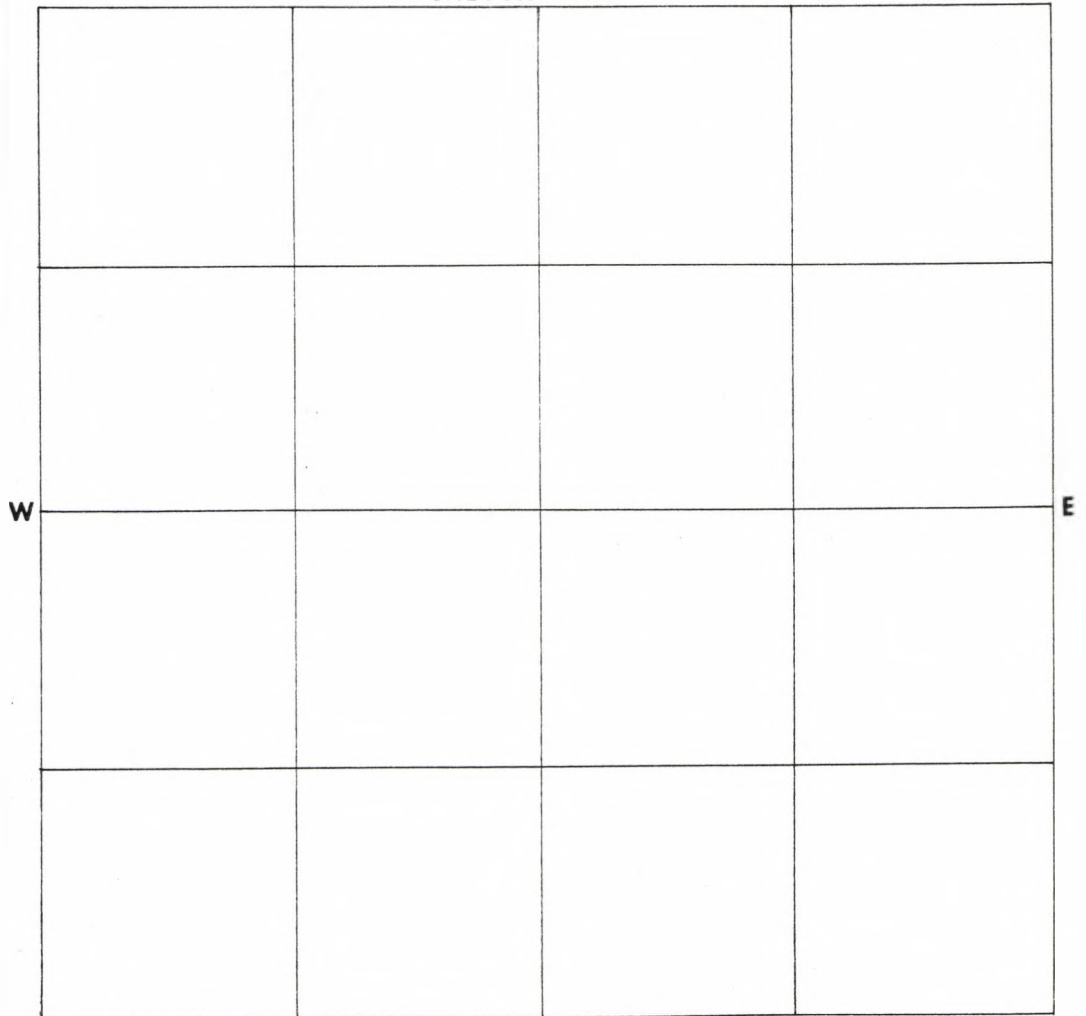


Photo B & W 8209-B-9 GENL SITE AREA, VIEW NW

The following is taken directly from Mountrail County Historical Society. 1979. Tales of Mighty Mountrail.

Upon the petition of Abner Weiste and 46 others filed on July 23, 1920 and a subsequent election and meeting on August 17, 1920, Big Bend Township was organized. Their first meeting was held at a country store conducted by Orvin Aubol on the SW1/4 of Sec. 11. The township was given the name Big Bend because its western boundary is the large bend of the Missouri River.

The first schoolhouse was built in 1917 on the NE1/4 of Sec. 32 and Orebell Olmstead was the first teacher. The first couple married in Big Bend was Louise Waterburg and James Sullivan. He was an employee of the Black Ranch and she was the sister of an early settler, Axel Watterburg. The first white child born was Medrith Larson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Larson in 1916.

Sybil McDonald, daughter of Angus McDonald, homesteaded in Big Bend. She was active in managing lyceum and chautauqua programs in the area. Later, she became a piano instructor in Sanish, Van Hook and Stanley.

Many artifacts associated with Indian settlements, fur trading and ranching have been found in this area attesting to man's habitation there long before homesteaders arrived.
