Upon the request of the North Dakota State Historical Society, SWCA conducted additional research on 32MN831 to determine whether the Feature 1 (schoolhouse) building addition originated from a portion of the Fort Berthold Indian Reservation that was inundated following the construction of the Garrison Dam (e.g., the town of Elbowoods). The goal of the additional research was to better assess the site's eligibility under Criterion A of the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP). Nelson Klitzka (SWCA Archaeologist) contacted the MHA Cultural Museum in New Town, North Dakota, on September 13, 2010, regarding any available information on 32MN831, specifically regarding the origin of the buildings. Mr. Klitzka spoke to Pauline Nez at the museum; Ms. Nez grew up in Parshall, North Dakota, and knew people who could provide additional sources of information. Ms. Nez herself had attended school in the Parshall area and was familiar with the buildings but did not know anything about the site's history off hand. She also indicated that, from her perspective, neither the original building nor the addition were likely historically significant (Pauline Nez, personal communication 2010a). Ms. Nez told Mr. Klitzka that she would perform record searches and contact people familiar with the history of the area. Mr. Klitzka followed-up with Ms. Nez on September 17, 2010, and she informed him that none of her contacts had any additional knowledge on the buildings and there were no additional records on the building origins at the museum. Ms. Nez suggested that SWCA speak to Joe Waldock, as the records indicated him as the most recent landowner (Pauline Nez, personal communication 2010b); however, SWCA already contacted Mr. Waldock and he did not know the origin or the function of the buildings.

Additionally, on September 15, 2010, SWCA (Stephanie Lechert, Nicholas Smith, and Chris McLaughlin) also visited the Fort Berthold Community College in New Town, North Dakota, to meet with several of Mr. McLaughlin's contacts. SWCA spoke with Devlin Driver, Tribal Studies Instructor, along with Susie Simpson and Clarice Baker-Big Back. However, none of these contacts could provide information about the schoolhouse. Finally, SWCA conducted a search of the United States Archives Online Photographic Database (The National Archives 2010) and the Denver Public Library Western Geneology Online Photographic Library (DPL 2010), both of which did not provide further information regarding the schoolhouse.

Historical research into local, regional, and national resources did not provide further information regarding the origin of the 32MN831 schoolhouse. Specifically, there was no archival or anecdotal evidence to indicate that the building addition had originated from portions of the Fort Berthold Indian Reservation that were inundated due to construction of the Garrison Dam. SWCA reaffirms the recommendation that 32MN831 is not eligible for nomination to the NRHP under Criteria A and B, as the site was not found to be linked to historically significant events or people. The site is recommended not eligible under Criterion C, as the architectural resource has undergone several modifications outside of the building's period of significance. The site is recommended not eligible under Criterion D, as the extensive ground-disturbing activities, including pipeline construction and tilling coupled with heavy vandalism and looting, has severely impacted the potential for the site to yield further information to the history of the region.

Historic research was conducted for the site location that included Bureau of Land Management (BLM)
General Land Office (GLO) land patents, BLM GLO survey maps, and United States census documents.
According to land patent documents, the property located in the NE1/4 of Section 29, T151N, R90W, was
originally patented by Eric Anderson on April 26, 1919, although there was no other documentation to
support Mr. Hansen resided on the property (BLM 1919). The only available BLM GLO survey map for
T151N, R90W was completed in 1910, and did not indicate that anyone had been residing on the
property (Farmer and Veigel 1910). The 1917-1918 World War I Selective Service System Draft
Registration Cards indicate a Swedish-born Eric Anderson was registered on June 5, 1917 at the age of
30 (U.S. Selective Service System 1918). The registration lists Anderson's address as Parshall, N.D.
and that he was employed as a farmer in Township 151 North, Range 90 West, Section 24. No Eric
Anderson appeared in any of the U.S. Census records for Mountrail County, but there are many Eric
Andersons, several with alternate spellings of both the first and/or last name, who live in nearby
counties. No other documentation was found pertaining to Eric Anderson in Mountrail County nor was
there any documentation connecting Anderson to local or state historical significance.
Through contacting the previous landowner, Joe Waldock, it was discovered that the structure (F1) was
an old schoolhouse, the original construction date of which is unknown. The landowner, who has farmed
the property for many years, stated that the structure had not been used in years and was falling victim
to vandalism (a hole punched in the roof among other damage) and rodent damage. The landowner also
stated that the structure was actually two schoolhouses put together end to end, with the second building
imported from another unknown location. The landowner did not know when the second building was
brought to the site (Lechert, Personal Communication a, August 10, 2010). The Superintendent of the
Parshall School District No. 3, Stephen Cascaden, was contacted to determine if an age could be
applied to the structure as the building is thought to be originally associated with this district.
Unfortunately, no date is available from the school district, but the superintendent guessed the building
was likely older than 50 years old (Lechert, Personal Communication b, August 10, 2010).
The knowledge of a second schoolhouse being imported from another location for the purposes of
adding on to the existing structure as well as the continued vandalism of the building further reduces the
integrity of location and setting of the site and negatively impacts the building's integrity of design. SWCA
reaffirms the recommendation that 32MN831 is not eligible for nomination to the National Register of
Historic Places (NRHP) under Criteria A and B, as the site was not found to be linked to historically
significant events or people. The site is recommended not eligible under Criterion C, as the architectural
resource has undergone several modifications outside of the building's period of significance, negatively
impacting the integrity of materials of the building. The site is recommended not eligible under Criterion
D, as the extensive ground-disturbing activities, including pipeline construction and tilling coupled with
heavy vandalism and looting, has severely impacted the potential for the site to yield further information

1. Feature Description, Integrity, Eligibility:

Feature 1 is a rectilinear building that appears to have had a large addition built on the southern half; this comprises nearly half of the current building's total length. The foundation for the southern half of the building is composed of poured concrete, while the northern half's foundation is a combination of steel I beams and wood beams.

The south façade has one door opening with a partial original door. A set of poured concrete stairs leads up to the doorway which appears to have been installed at a date later than the construction of the building. A single square window opening is located in the top center portion of the south façade, with the glass pane broken. The exterior cladding of the south façade is vertical milled lumber painted white with green painted wood shakes applied to the gable end.

The west elevation has what appear to be six window openings; however, all of the openings have been boarded up and covered in the same exterior cladding as the south elevation. The window openings all appear to be square dimensions that do not support the typical double hung window style indicative of early Victorian era architecture for the region, indicating that the window openings were potentially modified from their original design.

The north elevation has no window or door openings. The exterior cladding is the same as the south façade and west elevation, and the gable end is consistent with the south façade's gable end cladding. The west elevation of the building is clad in a white asbestos siding applied at a date considerably later than the period of significance for the building. There are two window openings on the west elevation of the building that are approximately 1.5 by 3.0 feet in dimension, typical of Victorian era architecture. The roof of the building is of a moderately sloping front gable design and is clad in recently applied three-tab asphalt shingles. A square brick chimney is located on the northern end of the roof ridge and appears to have been added to the building at a later date as evidenced by the relatively good condition of the chimney in comparison with the rest of the building. The building has pronounced eaves with exposed rafters and the rake is also very pronounced.

The building appears to have two separate portions: the original portion, which appears to be the northern half of the building including the chimney, as evidenced by the exposed wood and I-beam foundation; and the addition, which appears to be the southern half of the building with the newer poured concrete foundation. A distinct dividing line between the two portions of the building is evident along the roof and west and east elevations. The site has been subject to vandalism and exhibited several bullet holes.

Historic research of the site using BLM General Land Office land patent records did not reveal data as to the original owners of the site, nor did research indicate that the site was part of any major historic events for the region.

Feature 2 is a trash concentration consisting of historic and modern trash. The feature measures 15 by 25 feet with a height of 3 feet. The feature is well-defined and only lightly sodded. Feature 2 is composed mostly of field stone and non-historic trash, with approximately eight historic solder-dot cans and one fragment of non-diagnostic whiteware.
