#### 1. Feature Description, Integrity, Eligibility:

The feature is a one room, wood framed prairie school sitting a rock and concrete foundation. The school has shakes on a hip roof with a partial hip roof over the portico. There is a metal ridge cap at the peak and more metal ridge caps at the four hip seams. The chimney has fallen to the west and lays on that slope of the roof. There are eave troughs running all four sides of the school with a down spout at the northwest corner. The soffits are closed with bead board finishing. There is a wide header running under the eaves on all four sides.

The exterior walls are sided with 6 inch wood lap with 4 inch wood corner trim with very little paint remaining. There is a watertable at the bottom of the 5 east facing windows and it is present at the same height on the three other sides. There is a portico at the east entrance, one of the columns holding the roof up has fallen away and one of the sidewalls of the entry is leaning toward the step. The portico roof has beadboard on the under side of the roof as well as the soffits. The step itself is concrete. There is part of a wood door at the entry, most of the panels have been kicked in. There is another entry door on the west side, giving access to what might have been the coal or wood storage area. A small door on the wall of the south side looks to be a fuel door. There are two smaller, double hung windows on the south wall giving light into the coat rooms. Also on the south side there are wires and a meter box to indicate electricity. The 5, multipane windows on the east side have some glass intact but much of the lower portion of windows is broken away. One of the windows is totally covered. Much of the framework is still intact.

The entry is a small foyer with has a door to the right that goes into the main body of the school. To the left there are two coat rooms on the south side with a dividing wall that goes up about 3/4 of the way up. The south windows give light to the coat rooms. The coat rooms do not have doors but there is a door leading in from the entry. There is one more door at the west end of the interior south wall that leads to the west entry and perhaps fuel storage. The main room of the school has high walls of lathe and plaster and there is a trim board about 1 foot from the ceiling, all four walls. The ceiling is also lathe and plaster and there are old light fixture post hanging down. A wide trim board runs along the base of all the walls. The floor is toungue and groove hardwood in good shape. There are blackboards on the west and north walls. Inside the school more evidence of electricity with light switches and outlets.



#### 1. *Feature* Description, Integrity, Eligibility:

This site consists of a rural school. First recorded in 2010 by L. Meidinger, with an update by W. Stark in 2013, the school was constructed prior to 1917 or 1918. The site was revisited during the current (2014) ND Highway 20 inventory.

The building is wood-framed and is set on a concrete foundation. There are five double-hung windows on the east wall, and two on the south wall. The main entrance has a portico and knee-wall and roof leading to the east door. Siding consists of horizontal wood lap boards. A brick chimney was located on the west slope of the hip roof, but has collapsed.

According to research conducted by Stark in 2013 (see his Site Form Update), after the school was closed, it was used as a town hall and voting location until these functions were transferred to Courtenay. It was originally named the John Neva School #2 for the landowner and it being the second of four rural schools in this township.

The building is in moderately poor structural condition. It does, however, retain most aspects of cultural integrity, including setting, design, location, materials, workmanship, and feeling. The original site form recommended more work was required prior to a determination of significance. The updated site form recommended that the building is Potentially Eligible for the NRHP, but that historic associations would require further investigations.



#### 1. Feature Description, Integrity, Eligibility:

Feature 1 is a simple rectangular plan school building on a concrete foundation. It has wood lap siding and a hipped roof with wood shingles. Five, large, double-hung windows are aligned on the east wall, where the primary entrance is covered by a portico with a knee wall and roof supported by square columns (partially collapsed). A second door is found on the west side. A brick chimney has collapsed on the west slope of the roof.

The building has long been abandoned, and is in poor condition. The windows and doors are broken and partially missing, the portico is beginning to collapse, and the brick chimney has fallen onto the roof. Despite these concerns with its condition, the integrity remains largely intact with original location, materials, design and workmanship giving it a strong sense of association and feeling.

According to a local history, this school is known as John Neva School #2, named for the person on whose land it was constructed. It was the second of four rural schools in Durham Township, and was constructed by 1917. It is identified as "School No. 2" on the 1952 USGS topographical map. After the school closed, it was used as a town hall and voting place until these functions were moved to Courtenay (Courtenay Centennial Committee 1986; Smorada and Forrest 1983).

This school is recommended as potentially eligible for the National Register under Criterion A as a local, intact example of a rural school in Stutsman County from the early twentieth century. Further research is recommended to determine the eligibility of this property within the context of rural schools in Stutsman County.





Feature 1 is believed to have been a school based on its architectural form and location. The east side has the main entrance on the south end with five tall double-hung windows. From the photograph, the entrance appears to be a hipped roof supported by the wall and square columns on the two front corners. A knee wall extends directly east from the building and supports the column on each side of the entrance. Two small windows are located on the center wall at the top of the south wall. Views of the north and west sides were not available and the foundation could not be seen from the right-of-way. 
